








Spotlight on Nurture



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British Sign Language:

In school, KS4 and KS5 Nurture have been learning British Sign Language (BSL). So far, they have had an introduction to the alphabet, greetings, days of the week, numbers, seasons, and emotions. All groups have been very enthusiastic about the topic, and we are planning to incorporate it into my group's ASDAN portfolios. This was pre planned as part of their life skills lessons which has so far been very successful and has had a great deal of positive feedback from pupils and parents/carers.







Computing:

Reddish Hall School are currently working towards the NCCE Computing Education Quality Mark. This quality mark is awarded to schools who provide an excellent computing education to their students. It is achieved by providing a broad and engaging curriculum across all age groups, offering after school clubs, and giving great advice on career opportunities within the growing digital sector. Humanities:

In Humanities this second half term we have started our MFL topic, studying the forms of the verb to be in Spanish. We have also learned about Spanish culture. We went out to shop and cook "Cocido asturiano", a traditional stew from Asturias, in the rainy and cold North of Spain.







KS4:

Four of our Key stage 4 pupils, plus one member of staff, have recently shown an interest in learning German. For the last three weeks they've been learning about the country itself, greetings, how to describe themselves, numbers and more. The students have also been enjoying using language lab software to practice their skills and have all made outstanding progress.





What is an Eco Green flag award?

The green flag award is a seven-step programme to raise awareness of environmental issues and to help make schools and local communities more eco-friendly. It also has a big focus on education for young people of these issues and helping them work together to tackle these challenges. To achieve this, we have picked 3 areas within the Ten Eco Schools Topics where we will set out tasks to improve the environmental impact in schools, local, community, and even beginning to think globally.

Why?

My background has never been about the environment but over the last few years I've found out more and more about the damage we are doing to our planet, and I've become really interested in what every day people can do to help reduce our impact. It may seem like little steps but, as Archbishop Desmond Tutu said, "Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world".

WE HAVE CHOSEN 3 TOPICS



Our first challenge is to improve biodiversity. We've planted flowers, plants, and herbs to increase the number of insects and bees in our garden, and we've also created a bug hotel to encourage more wildlife to stay! The students have made and decorated bird houses and feeders from upcycled plastic bottles and wood to be places around the school grounds.

Our second initiative is tackling litter in the local area. As well as litter picking in the school grounds, we frequently visit local parks, canals, and grassy areas to reduce rubbish and keep the community looking tidy. We've even incorporated this into our Outdoor Education and STEM lessons. Rubbish doesn't just harm wildlife but on a large scale it can cost the government millions to clear!





Finally, we have chosen to improve our Global Citizenship. As a school, we've improved our role in the community by raising money for local and global charities through plant and craft sales. Charities we've raised money for include Wellspring Stockport, a local homeless person charity, The Donkey Sanctuary, which is a local animal welfare charity.



Tiny Tim:

On Friday 25th November we took some of the Eco warriors to The Donkey Sanctuary to adopt our very own donkey, Tiny Tim! It was a wonderful afternoon especially as we were able meet Tiny Tim's friends as well

Christmas craft sales:

On the 14th of December, the Eco Team put together a Christmas Crafts and Cuddly Toy Sale with all the proceeds going to The Donkey Sanctuary.

We managed to raise £81.20!



A big thank to everyone who came to the charity sale, we will now be able to adopt Henry, Tiny Tim's best friend. We can also provide The Donkey Sanctuary with plenty of hay and carrots for 2023!










STEM Quality mark:


Christmas competition

Students discovered how Banksy became the most talked about artist in modern history and explore the power of art to affect social change, inspire the public and lay bare the undercurrents of social issues.

Additionally, students have be learning about graffiti within Life skills and explored traditional spray-painting techniques within art. The group explored photography techniques on the DSLR cameras to record the exhibition and even looked at the different architecture in Media City.



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
