


Keystone:

Vocational students started training to use our new welding equipment.


Year 9 and Keystone 2 students all started their engine strip down and rebuild tasks, each having their own engine to work on.

Nurture

We sourced the willow from staff (thank you Kathryn, Sue and Nat for lopping it all down and filling your boot) and then foraged for ivy, fir and holly in Reddish Vale. We dried oranges and sprayed acorns gold. It was a challenge to construct the angel and keep the willow secure but with perseverance and skill we managed it. The class enjoyed the challenge of weaving and we had a trip to the garden centre for string and finishing touches such as tinsel and small lights. This was a fun and enjoyable project for the class who worked together and the end result was brilliant!



Nurture

In Nurture 5 this term we made pizzas and discussed equivalent fractions. It was a good opportunity to use some life skills too. We walked to the supermarket and bought our pizzas then returned to school to use the whiteboards and cut and show how fractions can be the same (equivalent). The children then enjoyed eating them!

In humanities with KS3 we have been looking at coastal erosion and the formation of sea stacks - thanks to Mel for art support as usual.



Prince's Trust:
